Ithough the phrase "more than just a show" has become commonplace and over used, in describing the US Egyptian Event, it is still accurate. The 33rd Annual Egypt-

ian Event, held from June 3-8, 2013, "Mares: Queens of the Nile," sponsored by Albaydaa Stud, left participants and attendees feeling enriched and inspired. Previous to the start of the week, The Pyramid Society President Bob Miars wrote, "The most anticipated week of the year for Pyramid Society members and Straight Egyptian Arabian breeding enthusiasts has finally arrived, and we are once again gathering for what promises to be another unforgettable week. This year will no doubt live up to its storied billing of showcasing excellent breeding programs, hosting numerous educational opportunities, and perhaps most of all, providing time to socialize with our fellow breeders."

In a week which included daily seminars, social events, meetings, shopping and a show-down time was a valuable commodity. But where else in the world could one spend casual, unscheduled time to amble around with industry

leaders such as: Judith Forbis, the matriarch of Ansata Arabian Stud; Omar Sakr of Egypt's Sakr Arabians; Arabian Horse Historian, Cynthia Culbertson; the famous Marion

Richmond of Simeon Stud; Jenni Ogden, recognized internationally both for her skills as a breeder and as a photographer; and Cynthia Richardson, the new President of the Arabian Horse Association--to name just a few.

A Contribution by Christie Metz

The Mares are Oueens

This year's Event theme "Queens of the Nile" was truly a fitting way to highlight the contributions made by our straight Egyptian Arabian mares. Following this theme, I was one of three breeders on a panel which included Judith Forbis of Ansata Arabian Stud and Judy Sirbasku of Rock Creek Arabians. It was quite an honor to share this panel with such distinguished breeders.

As we each chose the mare whose contribution was significant to our individual breeding programs, my obvious choice was Glorietasayonaara (Ansata Abu Nazeer x Glorieta Shahlima by Ansata Shah Zaman). She was the first straight Egyptian Arabian mare that Silver Maple Farm purchased and the foundation of our straight Egyptian breeding program. Her family is the Bint Bint Sabbah branch through Ansata Sabiha, of the Dahma Shahwaniah strain.

Twenty-four years ago, "Sayo" was the choice of my heart. I saw a snow-white mare floating across a paddock with her tail carried high, head in the air and nostrils drinking the wind--just as the books describe. I was instantly captivated. It was neither an educated nor knowledgeable decision at the time. Yet, I just knew she was ethereal and a very, very special horse.

Sayo provided the inspiration for Henry and me to become breeders and to learn about the Arab traditions of breeding. She gave us the desire to understand the continuum of the straight Egyptian. We learned through their history that the isolation of those Bedouin cultures strengthened the genetic prepotency in their herds by breeding the strongest to the strongest. The mares' pedigrees were the only ones kept orally for many years, demonstrating their value. These herds provided the rootstock for the founding of the straight Egyptian Arabian horse, as we know it today. Due to the many generations of inbreeding, the genetic contribution of these mares is prepotent even today.

At Silver Maple Farm our Glorietasayonaara family is four generations strong with sons and daughters, granddaughters and great grands. Although Sayo is no longer with us, her family reminds us daily of her beauty and presence. In every one of these relatives, we see her traits, both physical along with personality and I am still captivated.

Christie along with her husband Henry have been in the Arabian horse business since 1991. Thier multi-generational program of straight Egyptians is reknown for outstanding quality as well as beauty. She has been a past Board member and officer of the Pyramid Society and Henry served as President for eight years. They are both Trustees for Society and Christie serves as President of the Pyramid Foundation the 501 c 3 charitable education arm of the Pyramid Society.

Progressive Barn Parties








On Wednesday evening, the Progressive Barn Parties provided a blue jean and t-shirt kind of casual fun. The barns were filled with attendees buzzing around. While some canvassed the area on foot, others zipped around in golf carts jam-packed with people. The parties were scheduled such that when one was ending, another was beginning so that if one chose, it was possible to attend all. Each barn hosting a party generally offered a selection of food items, interesting beverages, and of course, a horse show--it was one of the most festive nights of the week!

The highlights of this year's Barn Parties were the presentations of: Sandy and Hank DeShazer's young stallion, Aziim Al Amaar (the 2013 EE Bronze Champion); Botswana (the 2009 EE Supreme Champion Stallion and the EE's leading sire from 2007-2012), owned by the Botswana Trust and presented by Talaria Farms; and his barn mate, Thamer Al Khalid (the 2010 Reserve National Champion Stallion of Egypt), owned by Al Bawady Stud and leased by Talaria Farms.





he EBC Live Stallion Auction is always another show highlight. As this year's auction was scheduled on a lighter class day, energy was high! For this annual Sale, the arena is converted into an exciting auction house with staging for live presentations. As usual, to get everyone warmed up, attendees were treated to wine and a generous selection of finger foods.

Auctioned off are breedings to stallions enrolled in the current Egyptian Breeders' Challenge Auction. The resulting foals from the breedings generated from this auction are then eligible to participate in the lucrative EBC classes as yearlings. Additionally it is also an opportunity to purchase breedings to certain enrolled stallions whose stud books are not open.

This year's lineup presented some of the most exciting stallions in our industry--and the final results proved them to be a very competitive group. The auction brought in a total of \$198,525--\$1,175 more than in the previous year, with Ramses Mishaal Nadir (Mishaal HP X Ramses Minx) topping the list at \$12,000! Another notable achievement was that by the young stallion, Ansata Sheikh Halim (Ansata Hejazi X Ansata Samiha). Ansata Sheikh Halim, who was bred by and is owned by one of the world's most accomplished breeders, Judith Forbis and her partners Mauri & Steve Chase of Chase Arabians, earned \$7,000 in his very first public offering!

Lifetime Member Recognition

The Egyptian Event continues to be a meeting place for Egyptian breeders around the world. This year was no exception as the Pyramid Society welcomed three prominent international breeders as guests and new Lifetime Members. No stranger to the Event, Dr. Hans Nagel and his charming wife, Nawal flew in from Germany. Owner of the world famous Katharinenhof Stud near Bremen, Dr. Nagel was recipient of the Pyramid Society Trustees Award in 2011. He is the current president of the World Arabian Horse Organization, a founder of the world famous Nation's Cup, a prominent international judge, and a founding member of the newly formed Egyptian Arabian Horse Pyramids Foundation of Egypt. He has authored several books and will release his latest one in August.

Another long-time breeder, who usually celebrates her birthday at the Egyptian Event, is Marion Richmond of Simeon Stud fame in Australia. Marion has been breeding countless champion Arabian horses "down under" for well over a half-century, and her farm name, Simeon, graces the prefix of prominent Arabians around the globe. One of the most famous is, of course, the internationally winning "triple crown winner", Simeon Shai, now an elder senior stallion the Metz's Silver Maple Farm. In Santa Ynez. Any Arabian horse breeder visiting Australia automatically wends their way to Simeon Stud near Sydney. Marion has long been a supporter and member of the Pyramid Society and it was a pleasure to welcome her to the roster of Lifetime Members this year.

Dr. Nasr Marei also joined as a Lifetime Member this year. The Marei family is one of the oldest and deeply rooted families in Egypt, The Albadeia Arabian horse breeding program, founded in 1935 was brought into global prominence by his father Sayed Marei, who was Minister of Agriculture in Egypt in the 50's and a strong supporter of the Egyptian Agricultural Organization. The Albadeia Stud, a stone's throw from the Great Pyramid of Egypt, has received thousands of visitors over the past half century, and Dr. Nasr, who has taken its breeding program to a new level, Always a most gracious host, he is well known as a prominent international Arabian horse judge as well as lecturer and a fine photographer. He was also the recipient of the Arabian Horse Breeders Alliance Lifetime Achievement Award at the Las Vegas Show in April 2013.

Judith Forbis has lived and traveled in the Arab world studying and writing about Arabian horses for more than fifty years, accompanied by her late husband, Donald, until his death in 2008. She is known worldwide for authoring The Classic Arabian Horse, The Abbas Pasha Manuscript (co-authored with Gülsün Sherif), Authentic Arabian Bloodstock, Volumes I and II which have become the bible for Egyptian Arabian horse breeders, among other books, educational articles, and documentary films. The Ansata breeding program of straight Egyptian Arabian bloodlines continues as it has in the past, to produce halter and performance champions and foundation bloodstock for royal, government and private breeding farms throughout the world. An international judge, artist, photographer, and president of Ansata Arabian Stud and Ansata Publications, Ms. Forbis is the first woman to win the prestigious J.W. Galbreath Award for outstanding entrepreneurship in the equine industry. She has also received numerous lifetime breeder awards, served as secretary of The Arabian Horse Trust, and has been publicly recognized by her peers for service to the international Arabian horse community. She and Douglas B. Marshall were co-founders of The Pyramid Society, he serving as the first president and she as secretary. Ms. Forbis later served as president and is currently a member of the Board of Trustees.



To what could only be attributed to a struggling economy, only 243 horses were shown compared to 307 in 2012, and 311 in 2011. That being said, this was a year for high quality. The judges for the 2013 US Egyptian Event were: Scott Benjamin of Canada, Holger Ismer of Germany, Murilo Kammer of Brazil, Marco Pittaluga of Italy and Renata Schibler of Switzerland.

The 2012 Pyramid Society's National Egyptian Breeders Conference in Tomball Texas, hosted by Sandra and Hank DeShazer at DeShazer Arabians, introduced the new publication titled Standard of Excellence: A Guide to The Pyramid Society Straight Egyptian Horse. In a very generous seven page dedication to the Standard and how it relates to this show specifically it is stated, "The purpose of the Breed Standard is to serve as a blueprint, a guide, a general framework, within which breeders make their own decisions as to style, details and in this instance use of the horses they will breed. It is used

by both breeders and judges alike." It

further states, "The Standard of

Excellence serves as the basis for the **judging** and **scorecard** used at The Egyptian Event."

Because of the huge payoffs, the Egyptian Breeders' Challenge Classes are two of the most competitive and exciting of the show. This year's winners shared from a pot of almost 80K! Competing were the yearling colts and fillies who were the progeny resulting from breedings won in previous Egyptian Breeder's Challenge Auctions. The unanimous EBC Champion filly was Amer Nihaal (Justynn X Evangeline CC), owned and bred by Ahmad Amer of Yorklyn Arabians, while Lalo RCA (Thee Desperado X Lola SIG), owned and bred by Rock Creek Arabians, was the EBC Colt Champion.

As there were wide variances in scorecard placement, the Senior Stallion Champion, Monther Al Nasser (Ansata Hejazi X Aliah Al Nasser), owned by Sheikh Nawaf bin Nasser Al Thani, was the only other unanimous winner. This demonstrates the depth of quality and degree of variation of "type" present in the exciting 2013 US Egyptian Event ring.
