



The 2014, 34th Annual US Egyptian Event, "Gleannloch Farms: The Legend & The Legacy," was a memorable experience. This show, which ran from June 3-7, was once again hosted

at the beautiful Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington Kentucky. In his welcoming letter at the front of the show guide, Bob Miars, The Pyramid Society President, wrote, "The Egyptian Event will no doubt live up to its storied billing of showcasing excellent breeding programs; hosting numerous educational opportunities; and, perhaps most of all, providing time to socialize with our fellow breeders. With the universal appreciation of the Egyptian Arabian horse that we all share, it's always easy to strike up a conversation with either a newcomer or an 'old timer!' Take the time to connect—or reconnect; it's part of what makes our Event so meaningful."

The Gleannloch theme of this year's Event touched on so many elements throughout the week and helped to create the magic that we all experienced. At a time when our community is looking for direction, the influence of the Marshalls and their own devotion to the breed was inspiring. Through various opportunities, we were taught their path to becoming breeders, their business ethics and their breeding program. We also witnessed the generations of influence their breeding program had within the show ring itself. Steve Diamond, who began his pro-

fessional career working for Tom and Rhita McNair at Gleannloch Farms shared, "It is thanks to the efforts of people like the Marshalls and the McNairs that we even have an Event as they championed the

promotion of the Straight Egyptian Horses."

The Egyptian Event has often been referred to as "more than a show"—and for this year in particular, this description could not be more accurate. Besides showcasing horses from some of the most prestigious SE breeding programs in the country, attendees were offered multiple opportunities to experience up close some of the countries most prestigious breeding stallions for consideration; daily social opportunities in a variety of settings both informally and as part of the daily schedule; and the once in a lifetime opportunity to participate in the historic Gleannloch Farms Premier and Showcase Auctions.

Becky Rogers of Kehilan Arabians shared, "For nearly forty years, Douglas and Margaret Marshall exemplified the idea of what it means to be guardians of the Arabian breed. They focused their breeding on producing beautiful and athletic horses that were sound, excelling in performance, racing and halter. They upheld the highest standards of business; their generosity was legendary; and Doug and Margaret Marshall selflessly devoted their efforts to the breed."

The EBC Live Stallion Auction is always another show highlight. Auctioned off are breedings to stallions enrolled in the current Egyptian Breeders' Challenge Auction. The resulting foals from the breedings generated from this auction are then eligible to participate in the lucrative EBC classes as yearlings. Additionally it is also an opportunity to purchase breedings to certain enrolled stallions whose stud books are not open.


This year's stallion auction was a huge success generating a total of \$156,000. What was particularly impressive was that so many of the stallions brought in respectable earnings. In all, there were twenty-four stallion service offerings whose earnings were \$3,000 and over.

However, true to the Gleannloch spirit in which we, as a community, both shared and celebrated, the highlight of this year's auction was the stallion service breeding to Makhsous, dontated by Kehilan Arabians, which sold for the highest dollar amount at \$8,000!

Gleannloch Farms: Showcase & Premier Auctions





Friday, June 6th, was a special day in which we will all remember with historical significance. Auctioned off were items from the famous Las Palmas estate of breeders Douglas and Margaret Marshall, of Gleannloch Farms. The items were donated by The Marshall's grandson, Dr. Doug Marshall and his wife Dr. Amrita Ahuja. In the catalogue, Cynthia Culbertson wrote, "Through this donation, the Marshall's legacy of giving, and their lifelong commitment to the Society and its ideal, shall live on."

The Showcase Auction, which was the first of the two, took place at Fasig-Tipton in Georgetown Kentucky, and was sponsored by Al Falah of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. The Premier Auction was held during the Gala, later in the evening.

Some of the premium items auctioned included: two handmade Bed-







ouin saddles with bridles and breastplates from Jordon, circa 1960; a pair of 20th century Orientalist water colors by Amy Barbaro; "The Falconer," a bronze by Pierre Jules Mene; two Judy Norquist bronzes; and a saddle blanket with the monogram of King Farouk I of Egypt. Bidding was competitive and each item earned impressive amounts.

However, it was during the Premier Auction that the heat was turned up as two items were introduced into the bidding: the halters that had belonged to Morafic and Nazeer. Although expectations were high, nobody could have predicted the thrilling outcome. Morafic's halter was the first to be sold. Then several items later, Nazeer's halter was on the block.

The bidding for Nazeer's halter began with a competitive spi-

rit and all bidders seemed confident. However, as the bidding passed the six figure mark, it turned from friendly competition to a fierce battle. Everyone held their breath as each man outbid the other, till the gavel fell. Finally, it was Mr. Mohammed Al Marzouk of Ajmal Stud (Kuwait) who was victorious in winning both halters: Morafic's for \$50,000 and Nazeer's for \$230,000!

he Judging panel for this year's Event included: Leslie Conner (USA), Helen Hennekens-van Nes (Belgium), Dr. Nickolaus Jung (Germany) and Irina Stigler (Russia). In 2013, The Pyramid Society released the official guideline for judging in its Standard of Excellence publication. Furthermore, as stated in the show guide, "Addressing the important facet of a Breed Standard for the unique horse that is The Pyramid Society Straight Egyptian Arabian, the Standard of Excellence also serves as the basis for the Scorecard used at The Egyptian Event."

The Futurity and all Straight Egyptian Classes are judged on what is referred to as the Modified European Judging System. "This system seeks to assess the individual horse against the 'ideal' or 'standard." The categories being judged are as follows: Type; Balance; Quality and Substance of Walk; Head; Neck and Shoulder; Body and Topline; Legs and Hooves; and Movement. The guide further advises, "The success of Egyptian Arabian Breeders rest in the notion that their horses can be readily identifiable as Egyptian Arabian—in any company. Therefore our score for TYPE is weighted by a multiplication factor of 5" (as opposed to the other categories whose multiplication factor is by 4).

As for the Egyptian Breeders Challenge Classes, scoring is comparative. This year the winners of the EBC classes shared from a pot of \$96,320! For both the Colts and the Fillies, each Class Winner was unan-

imous. The EBC Colt Champion was Hilal Al Sahrah ESA (EAI Silvereen X Suhair), owned by Michelle, Mallorie and Melanie Montague, and earned \$18,816. While the EBC Champion Filly was TF Sweet Vidalia (Botwana X Sweet Stella V), owned and bred by Curtis Westly of Talaria Farms. TF Sweet Vidalia earned her owner a check for \$18,816!

I would have to write the grand winner at this 2014 US EE was Al Shaqab Member Qatar Foundation as they captured three of the four Supreme Champion honors. As Tibrah Al Shaqab (Farhoud Al Shaqab X Twom Hiddiyya) became the Gold Junior Champion Straight Egyptian Filly, her stable mate Tajj Al Shaqab (Al Adeed Al Shaqab X Nada Al Shawab) earned the Supreme Colt honors despite the fact that not one judge chose him for first. It's also worth noting that not only did the 2010 US EE Supreme Champion Stallion, Farhood Al Sahqab, sire both the Gold Champion and Bronze Champion Filly, he also sired the Supreme Yearling Filly Silver Champion at the 2014 Arabian Breeders World Cup in Las Vegas.




